

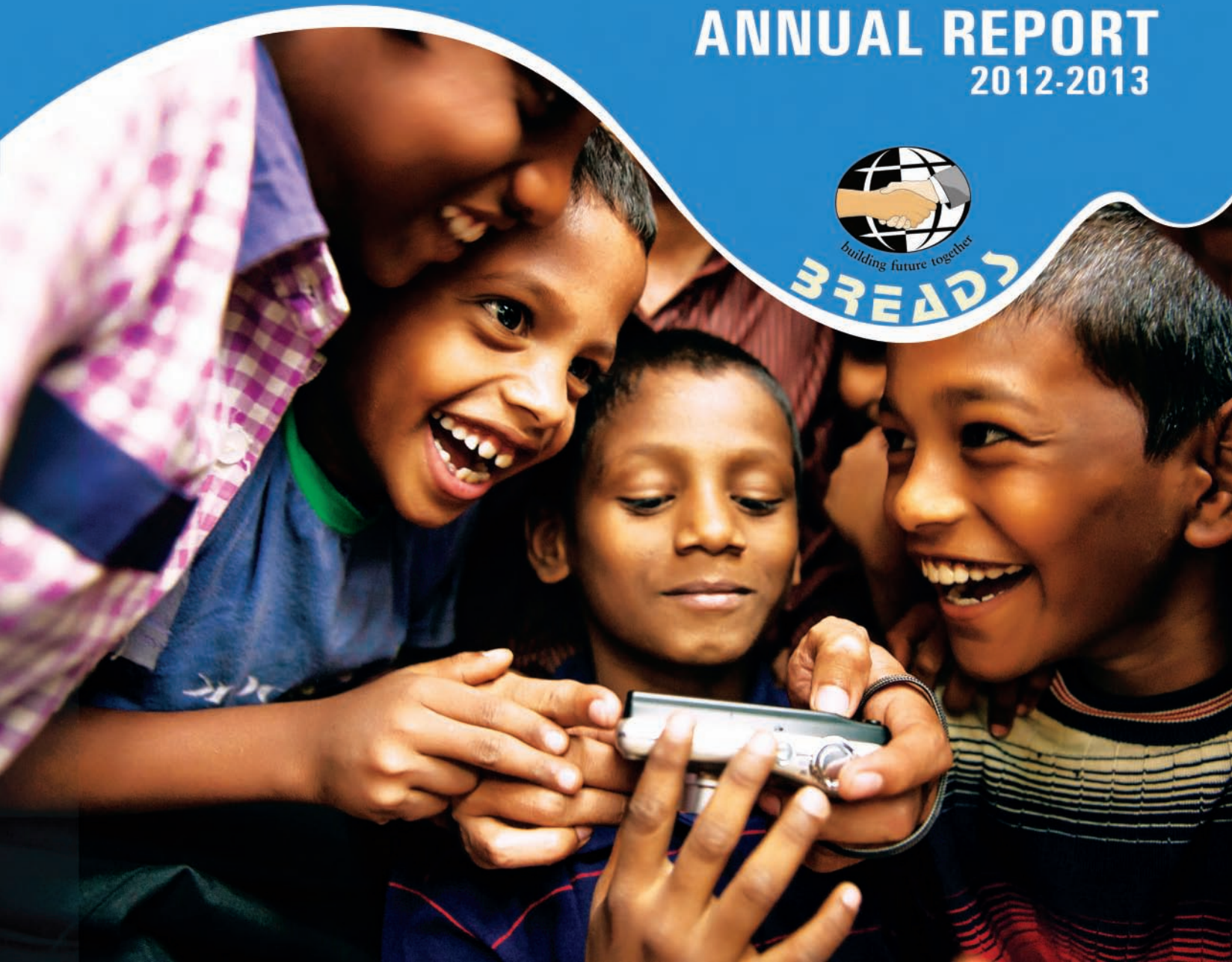

Director's Page

National policies, legislations and the much touted Millennium Development Goals are all there to give direction to developmental interventions. However, India is a country displaying different extremes and contradictions, all at the same juncture. Evidently, India will not meet its millennium promise by 2015. With children, the situation is demanding more and more attention on an urgent footing. Their very survival is becoming more complex in the present era of liberalization. '24% of parents in India report that their children go without food for an entire day while 17% confess that their children skipped school to go to work and pay for food'.

The picture in Karnataka also reflects the national scene. Government sources quote that 47000 children are severely malnourished. The drop out count is also high at 6.28 lakh.

Amidst all these realities, BREADS continues to make its dent in its own unique way. Having been a facilitator by providing bridge courses, skill training for marginalized youth, rescue and rehabilitation for vulnerable children, we have now come to a new phase - the rights based approach. Project CREAM (Child Rights Education and Action Movement) was launched in December 2012 to protect and promote children's rights, with the participation of children and community members. Children at the centre stage of decisions taken for them and establishing platforms to allow them to articulate their say are the key concerns.

This Annual Report will give you a glimpse of all our activities with children and youth, and also introduce you to CREAM. This is also an opportunity to consign my thanks and gratitude to Board of Trustees, our Donor Partners, Staff of BREADS and Local Projects for timely guidance, partnership and support rendered out to those most in need.

Let us continue this partnership in 'building future together' for those who are hardly visible in the mainstream.

GETTING THEM OUT OF THE 'DEPRIVATION TRAP'

Every community is unique with its inherent strengths and weaknesses. Inequality is manifested in multiple forms. Those that characterize extreme poverty cannot be moved unless institutions and people work together. Here are our Community Development Projects conceived, planned and implemented with the communities, for, all the decisions will impact their lives the most.

We believe that every last person in the community counts. Be it a child or a woman or abandoned elderly or vulnerable youth, the projects work on creating locally sustainable networks that not only augur their holistic development, but also reinforce knowledge on disturbing social issues like child labour, school drop outs, child marriages, etc.

In going back to the people who are in need of assistance to fight poverty and deprivation, we reinforce participation and build roads for innovation. With our networks in the communities constantly available for the people, a holistic approach is invariably adopted ensuring that the needs of the communities are met appropriately.

In implementing the 7 Projects across 6 districts of Karnataka and Kerala State in 2012-2013, BREADS continues to walk the extra mile to make these communities sustainable, specifically focusing on the most vulnerable groups – children and women. During the year, through various Don Bosco projects we have reached out to more than 75000 marginalized people from 78 rural villages and 17 urban slums.

SUCCESS STORY

HOME MAKER TO ENTREPRENEUR AT 45.

Managing a family of children from the meager income of husband working as a local driver was a huge challenge to Egna Freddy. At 45 years, when she was desperate about the need for more money to support her children's school and college fee, she looked for help. Microcredit from FCDP Kollam came in handy.

She took a loan of Rs 5000 initially, purchased a grinder and embarked on the venture of food processing by making flour for local breakfast items (rice cake, steamed rice cake, etc) and sold them in the neighbourhood. Taste of success encouraged her to take two more loans of Rs 10000 each from FCDP. From flour, she diversified to wine making, milk packaging, cake making, etc.

With more income, she became capable of giving her children more amenities at home. Their house is now renovated and her two sons are into professional courses like Engineering, Multimedia & Animation. Her new role as an entrepreneur with FCDP's assistance has given her the confidence to manage the expenses of these courses and the household expenditure. Her husband also helps her in marketing the products. Besides regular repayment, she is also saving in her Self Help Group. Her daughter in class 8, Surabhi is proud of her mother and says, "I see my mother as an example of hard work and persistence. I want to be successful like her". Egna responds with a smile of gratitude for the FCDP Kollam.

YOUNG at RISK (YaR)

In 2012-2013, BREADS had supported 9 projects, impacting the lives of 5568 underprivileged and vulnerable children. By now, it is needless to say that summer camps organized under YaR are the most awaited programme during a year in all the regions where we are present.

WITH THE YOUNG, CHANNELISING THEIR ENERGIES

It is ironical to learn that a large part of the population in our country, supposedly seen as our strength, the children and youth are among the most neglected and vulnerable. A lot of fissiparous forces out there allure them, rendering them vulnerable and dependable. BREADS works to make sure that these youngsters are transformed to constructive and valuable human capital for the nation.

Children subjected to labour, harassment, trafficking, drop out situations, infected / affected by HIV/AIDS, street children, those from disadvantaged communities and broken families – are all here under one roof, living and learning like all other kids of their age. Rescue and rehabilitation has been our strength since establishment. No stone is left unturned in providing them the most comfortable, family-like and joyful atmosphere.

A carefully tailored approach to their development makes sure that there is enough to chew for the mind, body and soul. Alongside reiterating their right to care and protection, inculcating virtues of self confidence and social responsibility enables them to also become efficient peer educators, who can further arrest the conditions of vulnerability in the community.

SUCCESS STORY

FROM DESPERATION TO A GUARD OF LAW AND ORDER

Mounesh. K, son of Rangappa from Garbagudi village of Harapanahalli taluk, Davangere district, dropped out of school when he was studying class 6. After his father's death while he was 6, and 4 more brothers to support, he started working in a neighbourhood farm.

During the initial days of the Residential Bridge Course a social worker came across the boy and discovered his interest in learning. After one year in the Residential Bridge Course, he was readmitted to the Government school at Harapanahalli for class 7, along with Government hostel facilities. With II class result in SSLC, DBCLM helped him to study further. He was admitted to a private college in Harapanahalli for PUC where he passed with 82%.

With an 80% marks in D.Ed (Diploma in Education), he started preparing for various competitive examinations and in December 2010 got selected for the post of police constable in Davangere District.

He is all ears to what his mentors have to say. Yet, wants to make a point. "I would work for seeking justice for the poor. Thanks to DBCLM and I will make them proud".





EDUCATION PROMOTION

DRIVEN TO EMPOWERMENT THROUGH EDUCATION

Education can make the difference that a bag of money cannot do. When taught that they are important and matter to the society, children will be able to contribute their part in protecting them from multiple factors. In spite of this realization and the passage of Right to Education Act in 2009, the number of school drop outs at the middle school level and that of girls especially in the remote rural areas, did not show a plummeting trend. This situation called for an intervention where drop outs were either brought back to school or given assistance outside school to learn so that their right to education is not affected due to family circumstances.

Drop outs and out of school children were the main concern when we decided to introduce the supplementary education programmes.

EDUCATION SUPPORT AND HARD WORK TOGETHER MAKE A DOCTOR

Dincy Davis' story yet again reminds us what timely assistance can do to children who are vulnerable and in need. Life in a rented house in Trivandrum with father (only bread winner) working in a hotel, a housewife mother and an elder brother limited her affordability for formal education. Fortunately, she had another chance at education. She was shortlisted for BREADS - CFCA Sponsorships in 2003. Since class 5, she has been able to study with the aid of this sponsorship. Her performance was very promising. 85% in SSLC and 90% in Higher Secondary Course motivated Dincy to pursue higher studies and BREADS - CFCA to support her in this endeavour. Post completion of a course on entrance examination for professional courses, she got admitted for MBBS in Maharashtra.

Dincy is very thankful to our sponsorship and is glad to know that many more students like her are also supported through this programme. "MBBS has happened today for me because of the sponsorship. I am very lucky to have gotten this sponsorship. Thanks to BREADS and my sponsor. I will surely come out successfully and try to help students like me".



The Children were facilitated to comprehend that education is a right and that all children must be in schools. So much so that they all become ambassadors of the message. In 2012-2013, BREADS had implemented 7 projects that reached out to 5092 children, including 2450 Girls. In addition, 692 children were given scholarships worth Rs.9346840 to continue their higher studies.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

“HANDS ON TRAINING TO MAKE THEM CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY”

What is important? To learn the knack of filling a bucket with water or that of opening the tap? In a country where we have youth comprising the major share of the population, it is imperative that their employability is well groomed. However, the scenario of school drop outs, child labour and other parameters prevent youngsters from poor socio economic background to move up to the next level in the social ladder.

BREADS sent out a strong message to these youngsters – that a drop out or an illiterate can have a better future, through its skill training programmes. Youngsters left out from main stream – formal education realm, like those from the remote villages, from SC/ST and minority communities, slums, etc are mobilized, oriented, trained on 15 different domains and placed in jobs. These are youngsters who would have otherwise accepted their vulnerability and continued to live with hand to mouth existence.

The formal and non formal skill training programmes over a wide range of spectrum has allowed them to dream a better life, and also achieve it. In the process, they become active participants in the country’s service sector.

During the year 2012-13 about 5611 youths were trained both in formal and non formal sector in 15 different domains from our 22 technical institutions. Around 72% (4071) of them were placed in jobs. The training programmes in all the domains have a complementary package called Bosco Plus, where the students are taught Communicative English and Basics of Computers. The routine of classes, exposure visits and on job training ensure that these students come out in flying colours, confident, self reliant and beginning to dream bigger. Another major achievement for the year is the completion of two technical schools - in Bidar, Karnataka and Palakkad, Kerala.



Accenture: CSR Project of Accenture for Hospitality is implemented in 22 centers across Kerala & Karnataka.

BOSCH India Foundation: Through the support of Bosch India Foundation BREADS implemented skill training in 4 centers across Kerala & Karnataka.

LIST: BREADS venturing with Land Mark Institution for Skill Training implemented skill training in 13 centers in Karnataka.

Don Bosco ITIs: Through 5 formal training institutes many youngsters are trained and placed across Kerala and Karnataka.

SKILLS GROOMING FUTURE

Vani B hails from a small family of five in V. Palya, Chitradurga district. Parents as daily wage labourers, 2 school going sisters and the financial instability at home forced her to stop at PUC. With the determination to educate her sisters, she gave tuitions for the neighboring children.

While exploring sources for additional income, she learnt about the skill training programmes for drop outs, along with facilitated job placement. Despite her parents discouraging her, she convinced them and came to our centre with few more friends like her. After induction, she was selected for Retail Marketing trade and here began her dream for a better future.

Her interest and participation in the classes was remarkable. She was really active and amazing in her performance. She was also a good dancer. She remembers her training period with gratitude and happiness and says, “A foundation for my future life was laid in DB-Tech. I am grateful to DB-Tech staff who transformed my life.”

During the placements, she was selected as a Customer Relation Officer for Bharath Matrimony in Chennai. She started earning Rs. 11,200/- per month along with benefits like PF & ESI. She continued her job with happiness. Enquire about her experience and this is what she has to say, “I found it difficult to adjust with the new people here. I was afraid of the life in Chennai. Now I am really happy that I have developed courage to face challenges in life. I have been working here for more than 8 months now. I find my life interesting in a new place. I see new and vibrant colors in my life. I am happy.”

Her parents, who discouraged her initially, have something interesting to say now. “We underestimated our daughter’s caliber, courage and desires. Now we realize that we were wrong. Each female should get training as our daughter got. It helps build their levels of self-confidence and feel secure about their own future”.



CREAM aims to train 75000 children in child rights, impart Human Rights Education in 450 schools covering 22500 children and form 300 task forces comprising members of the community in the project areas that will work for the protection of child rights. Presented here are the details of programmes organized between December 2012 and March 2013.

CREAM

(Child Rights Education & Action Movement)

Bring Human Rights to Life

Project CREAM - Child Rights Education and Action Movement was formally inaugurated on December 3rd 2012. CREAM is here to establish child participation as the key facet of child development. CREAM wants to achieve a high level of child participation in child development, promote child rights and ensure child protection by establishing the appropriate structures and networks in the 10 districts of Karnataka chosen. One of the objectives is to introduce child rights education in the school curriculum of the State by demonstrating its effectiveness through the project.

PRESS CLUB MEETING BY CHILDREN

Selected members from the Child Rights Clubs in Davangere district came forward to address a press meet. This reiterates our belief that children can and must be allowed to participate in their own development process. The children illustrated cases of child sexual abuse from neighbouring districts and put forward 10 solid demands during the meet. The active participation of children in this press meet served an exemplar to be replicated in all other project districts.

Stringent punishment for the criminals, speedy trial and prosecution of the perpetrators and immediate dismissal of the government officers who sexually abuse minor girls, were among the demands put forward by the children. Also, the children called for a strict implementation of laws banning child labour and child marriages that are still so rampant.

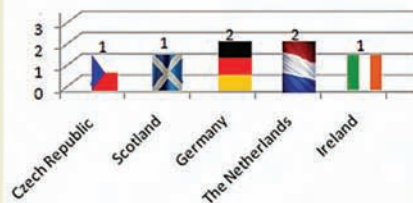
Their respect for their right to participation was evident when they were categorical about Children's Gram Sabhas that must be conducted every November and the need to discuss Child Rights Clubs activities in the meetings of Village Education Officers, District Director of Public Instruction and others. It was a new leaf in the chapter of BREADS. Our belief in children's ability to identify solutions to their problems if provided with the requisite knowledge of their rights, was proved very right!

Some of their demands...

1. In cases of child sexual abuse, the perpetrator must be arrested immediately.
2. Judgements have to be passed on all the pending cases pertaining to child sexual abuse, at the earliest.
3. Perpetrators of child sexual abuse must be awarded death sentence.
4. The law against child sexual abuse must be implemented effectively.
5. In cases of child sexual abuse within school premises, the perpetrators are only suspended for 3 months, with half the salary reaching them. They must be dismissed and not be provided with any of the benefits.

VOLUNTEER PLACEMENTS

BREADS promoted and facilitated the service of volunteers from across the world. The volunteers have devoted their time, skills and talents in educating and motivating the children, youth and women in our various projects. During the year 2012-13, 7 volunteers from 5 countries were placed in various projects across Kerala and Karnataka. Two MBA students from NMIMS



Mumbai and Two MSW students from Don Bosco College Angadikadavu were also placed at BREADS for their academic internship and block placement.


