

### Don Bosco on the Streets





I don't want to beg, I want to study; was the plea of 11-year old Sony (name changed), who was found by the BOSCO street presence staff at the KSR (main) railway station in Bangalore. Sony was taken to the girls' shelter at BOSCO Vatsalya Bhavan (BVB) where the search for her family began.

A child alone on the big city streets, living on scraps of mercy, Sony had vivid accounts of long days among the changing faces at crowded signals and public places (bus and train stations etc.), begging and peddling chewing tobacco for her stepfather.

The BVB staff tried to put together the circumstances that had forced Sony on to the streets to earn for her family. Sony was unable to communicate many details about her life before coming to Bangalore. She initially mentioned Kotipi in Andhra Pradesh, but checking with the CHILDLINE and police station there did not provide any clues. Many days later, Sony happened to mention Peddapadu hostel in Kurnool district, to the counsellor. The BVB staff contacted the Kurnool Child Welfare Committee (CWC) and Sony was identified as one of the previous residents of the Girls Home in Peddapadu.





The various bits of Sony's story came together. A native of Kurnool, Sony's family broke up when her mother left her father, who was addicted to alcohol. Unfortunately, and in ignorance of the facts, Sony's mother remarried a man who begged for a living. She could not change him nor the circumstances and was forced to join him, taking Sony out of the Peddapadu Girls' Home, where she had been living for a while. The family begged during the days and spent the nights on the street; and after a while, migrated to Bangalore to continue this lifestyle.

Though her parents are not yet traced, Sony found a home in the hearts of the many people she met along the way. For the BVB staff, Sony was an adorable child, who readily listened to instructions and willingly joined interested in studying, Sony also attempted

the 'bridge course' at the centre. With guidance and counselling, she started to let go of the residual guilt and shame from her time on the streets, and left BVB with a new determination to not let anyone or anything drag her back into the helplessness she had experienced on the streets. The BVB staff accompanied Sony back to Kurnool, where she has happily resumed her studies in the Peddapadu Girls Home.

The Don Bosco presence on the street, became in Sony's life, the personification affirmation of her voice and rights as a person. That vigilant presence of the staff has helped restore her lost childhood and most importantly, a life free from the hands of the exploiters, waiting to prey on vulnerable children for their evil ends.







Street presence is the lifeline of a Don Bosco Young at Risk (YaR) centre. It can be explained as a vigilant, proactive, dynamic, physical presence of a committed, caring adult at any location that a child may be at risk, to prevent harm to the child. It is very easy for vulnerable children to be picked up by pimps and traffickers, and therefore, the need for our 24/7 presence at strategic locations, backed up by a patrolling rescue vehicle. Vigilant street presence teams are often are the first responders to children at risk, and an effective deterrent to traffickers and violators of child rights.

Despite the vast difference in the scenarios on the street over the years, this preventive and proactive nature of street presence remains the same. All the staff in a YaR centre are fully oriented towards the importance of street presence, especially for a lost child; and most staff are deployed to strategic locations across the city. Fr George PS recollects that the Salesians (priests and clerics) took turns to go out after dinner, to the bus and railway stations, city market, etc.; where children would be found, to meet them and talk to the people around them, building caring communities on the street, creating awareness about child rights, and safe options for children at risk. It was also a practice for the staff to go out during power outages to be present on the streets.

This physical presence is expanded through the formation of 'caring communities' on





the streets: sanitary workers, auto drivers, railway staff, police personnel, vendors etc. who are made aware and responsible for alerting the child protection system about a vulnerable child. More than 400 such individuals have been enlisted into this service for children, becoming the eyes and ears of child protectors. Backed up by shelters, counselling, advocacy, partnerships, and networking with government and nongovernment entities, this crucial service of street presence has been spreading a safety net to rescue children from the dangers of the street, child labour, and other violations of their rights.

## Street Presence: The Power of the Person

Ms Sheeba Thomas, in-charge of BOSCO Bhavan, having worked with Vatsalya BOSCO since the 1980s, recollects warmly, the richness as well as the challenges of being in the company of children and youth on the street, especially as a woman. The boys felt proud that someone wanted to talk to them, and her presence among them on the street prevented them from fighting, drinking, gambling, and above all, protected them from middlemen. They learned to save their money. As a paramedic, she could help them develop healthier habits to manage their lives better. The boys looked forward to a 'by-two' (half cup) chai and biscuit with her.

Ms Sheeba says working with children at risk demands high commitment to the child's best interests, and the heart to love and accept the child unconditionally. It calls for the openness to see the goodness in the child and learn from them. Exactly as Don Bosco advised, a caring presence has the

immense power to prevent harm and turn lives around.

Another veteran with 25 years of presence on the streets, Mr Ramaswamy from BOSCO Bangalore, echoes Ms Sheeba. He says the job is not easy because even we are at risk on the street, on behalf of the child at risk. Being present on the street calls for passion, dedication and commitment. If one has these, one is ready to sacrifice oneself for the best interests of the child. Then there's no need to dwell on whether the task is easy or hard. The social worker must get out of his comfort zone, face the threats of child rights violators, go to the children wherever they are, accept them as they are without any bias of caste, gender etc., listen and think from their perspective and so, create a presence for the child. The child must feel and know this presence of the social worker in their lives, even on the street, because the child is our destiny.

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## Street Presence: A Preventive Presence

by both Mr Manoj Ouoted Kumar (Chairperson- Kerala State Commission for the Protection of Child Rights- KSCPCR), and Fr George PS (Executive Director-BREADS), as they stressed the need for urgent concerted action to prevent the everincreasing substance use among children and youth in Kerala. KSCPCR and BREADS were the joint organisers of a significant State-level Stakeholders' Workshop on 29 February in Thiruvananthapuram, facilitating the active participation of 178 stakeholders from various government departments and NGOs. They had all assembled to discuss the







status of substance use among the youth in Kerala, and the measures needed to address the issue.

Each of the key Kerala government representatives — Dr V Venu (State Chief Secretary), Mr K V Manoj Kumar (Chairperson -KSCPCR), Dr Sharmila Mary Joseph (Principal Secretary-Women & Child, Social Justice, and Local Self Governance), Mr S. Shanavas (Director-General Education) highlighted the different interventions by their respective departments towards substance use prevention among children. The KCPCR Chairperson assured all the stakeholders that their suggestions and deliberations would be presented to the state government for improvement of policy


and implementation, and to foster a publicprivate partnership.

With its strong presence in ten of fourteen districts in Kerala, since its inception in 2021, the BREADS' DREAM initiative has reached out to 10,38,723 children, 88,969 parents, 2342 teachers, and 4347 ambassadors through awareness programmes. With its counselling services and rehabilitation centre, DREAM and the Don Bosco network are in a position to spearhead a public and private partnership in the effort to help the youth of Kerala break free from addictions. The State-level Stakeholders' Workshop is a good start.


