Ipsos Mori, a collaborator on the International Women's Day annual study, with the Global Institute for Women's Leadership at King's College in London, has found that the majority of men acknowledge that gender equality can only be achieved with men's support, however around half think that they are being expected to do too much. Two thirds of those surveyed believe that women won't achieve equality in their country unless men take actions to support women's rights too. However, opinion is split on whether too much is being expected of men to help the fight for equality. 43% agree that men are being expected to do too much, compared with 46% who disagree. Agreement is higher among men than women (50% vs 36%).

In BREADS' project for gender equality, we make sure that men are included so that they are aware of the need for gender equality and contribute to the efforts of women for this cause.

The life of women labourers in the sugarcane belt of Maharashtra is a tug of war between life and death during the sugarcane cutting season. They are employed in the fields between October and March and the income they earn then helps them sustain for the rest of the year. The irony of the story is that women with ovaries are not hired by the contractors in this region. The Hindu Business Line in its ground report highlighted the sad fact that the women are left with no choice but to resort to hysterectomy than to lose their income. Yes. You read it right. Let's wake up and act. The women should not need to pay for their femininity anymore; instead, men should be taught the art of accepting and appreciating the human female anatomy and traits. The structural oppression clubbed with stigmas dominates the face of the
