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From the Director's Desk ...



Don Bosco Ajjanahalli has been serving the young at risk, especially those rescued from the streets of Bangalore for the past 14 years. During the course of time, the institute has mainstreamed more than 1500 children from the street and from child labour. It is ideally located at a distance of 60 kilometers from the city of Bangalore in a village. The inmates initially

were children who were exploited in the street and who were forced to get into unhealthy habits of consuming alcohol, smoking, addiction to drugs, inhaling whitener solution, sniffing petrol etc. Counseling and de-addiction camps are organized for the new entrants to the institution. Later on the project felt the need to rehabilitate also the children who were child labourers and school dropouts from the neighboring villages. The project soon developed a major medical project reaching out to the villages with health services.

The "Help Alliance" and "Miles to Help", the CSR Wings of Lufthansa Airlines through Don Bosco Mondo, Germany have been the principal project partners for Don Bosco Ajjanahalli for more than last 9 years. BREADS is grateful to these agencies for their overwhelming continuous support to sustain this center and the children. In this issue of "SLICE", we look at this project and its major interventions.

Don Bosco Yuvakara Grama Ajjanahalli- rekindling childhood and smiles



Don Bosco Yuvakara Grama (DBYGA) at Ajjanahalli was initiated in 1999 with the intention to reach out to children and young at risk and rehabilitate them. With the intention, came the necessity to do a survey to comprehend the situation of children and youth in Magadi Taluk. This survey, conducted in October 1999 helped us understand the plight of child labourers and bonded labourers in Bangalore Rural region, convincing us on the need to establish a rehabilitation centre for those kids who had no takers.

Rehabilitation Centre for Vulnerable Children

The centre's erection began in November 1999, with Unicef abetting the effort. Soon, the rehabilitation of street children and child labourers demanded a concerted effort. In carrying the mission forward, the Salesians decided to form a network of the like minded groups, christened 'Magadi Makkala Dwani', to tackle the menace of child labour in Magadi Taluk.

At the rehabilitation centre, the children are counseled and repatriated with their families. Those left behind are motivated and counseled to get out of the trauma suffered during the days of hard labour or street life. Sports, ex-



tra curricular activities, life skills training, theatre, etc are used to help in the overall development of the children. They are all mainstreamed in schools after a specific interval at the bridge school so that they can keep up with their peers in the open world. 150 children benefitted from this multi pronged intervention last year.



As a recognised centre of Karnataka Open School Scheme, the centre facilitated the completion of SSLC exams of

school drop outs over 14 years of age. Complementing this effort, tuition centres are conducted in the villages to help slow learners after school hours.

DBYGA, through its networked strategy was able to eliminate child labour in Magadi Taluk. The local government authorities are kept abreast of the children and youth who are out school for various reasons. This engagement at the government and non government level has borne fruit over time. DBYGA received a STATE AWARD for the BEST CENTER in rehabilitating street children and child labourers. It was conferred by the Department of Labour, Government of Karnataka on the occasion of World Anti Child Labour Day – 12th June 2013.



Community Outreach Programmes



Involvement in the villages has been manifested in the adoption of two schools in the Taluk and establishment of a health programme to reach villagers who stand the least chance to benefit from health facilities. The mobile clinic visits the villages every Tuesdays and Saturdays, making it to 4 villages every time. The dispensary at the centre, besides taking care of the children in the centre, reaches out to the villages through the out patient days and village visits by the mobile unit. More than 200 villagers are benefitted from this programme every month.
