# World Children's Day Celebrations - 2024

The UNICEF theme for this year's celebrations was Listen to the Future, calling for the adults to listen to the children's ideas, opinions and dreams, both for themselves and the world. Like the young Jesus, many children also have hopes and visions that can change the world. We need to listen!



# The Future Begins With Our Children -Let's make it Bright

Children's Day was celebrated with enthusiasm across various districts by BREADS' local Don Bosco partners, focusing on the crucial themes of protecting child rights and raising awareness about harmful practices such as child marriage. Events held between 14-17 November 2024, empowered children to become advocates for their own well-being and that of their peers, highlighting the importance of safeguarding their future.

A notable event took place at Avaragolla Government High School in Davanagere taluk, where a thought-provoking debate was organised around the topic "Child Marriage - A Blessing or a Curse?" Fourteen students actively participated in the debate attended by 150 students and five teachers. The session effectively raised awareness about the ill-effects of child marriage, its long-term consequences, and the importance of taking preventive measures. The debate encouraged students to reflect on their roles in promoting social change.







BOSCO Bengaluru hosted a grand celebration at the BOSCO Life Skill Training centre in Sumanahalli. The event, which welcomed over 900 children, 120 staff members, and 46 volunteers, was themed "Family is Where I Belong." Former Minister for Women and Child Development, Smt. Umashree, graced the occasion and praised BOSCO's unwavering commitment to empowering underprivileged children.



In Chitradurga, Makkalotsava 2024, a fun-filled event, engaged children in games, competitions, and cultural performances. In Bidar, various competitions helped emphasise the significance of children's rights and the importance of education for their holistic growth and development.

These celebrations were not merely events but crucial moments for raising awareness about the challenges that children face today. The activities offered children not only a chance to celebrate, but also to learn and engage with important social issues. Through cultural performances, speeches, and discussions, the events offered children spaces for safe expression. The events emphasised our shared responsibility of protecting children and creating safe spaces where they thrive and achieve their potential.

UNICEF's 2024 report State of the World's Children outlines three megatrends that are reshaping the lives of children— climate disasters, demographic shifts, and technological



disparities—something that we observe in our work as well. In his World Children's Day message, acknowledging the challenges facing the world's children, UN Secretary António Guterres said, "It is shocking that in the 21st century, any child still goes hungry, uneducated, or without even the most basic healthcare."



In these contexts, we are reminded of the need to continue to protect children's rights, something that BREADS does through interventions, advocacy and inspiring communities to act; through initiatives like CSN (Child Safety net), CLEP (Child Labour Elimination project), MINDS (Mental Health Initiative for Nurturing Development and Support), mobile clinics and ECO (Educate to Cultivate Organically), among other initiatives.

## The Child's Right to a Family

On 6th November, BREADS' Child Safety Net team in Kalaburagi conducted significant event to launch its campaign on adoption other alternative and forms of care such as kinship care and foster care. The campaign was inaugurated by the District Commissioner (DC), who highlighted critical the



need to advocate for children's rights and continued efforts to promote adoption initiatives, and strengthen alternative forms of care ensuring that every child has a right to family with institutionalisation as last resort for a child. "This campaign is not just about one day—it's about turning every day into a celebration of love, care, and shared responsibility for our children," the DC remarked.

During the ceremony, Ms Fauzia Tarannum, District Child Protection Officer (DCPO) led the gathering in a meaningful pledge, reinforcing people's commitment to raising awareness and ensuring every child receives the care, love, and support they deserve in family-based care. This initiative served as a powerful reminder of our collective responsibility to ensure a brighter future for children through alternative forms of care and putting into effect all that is needed for the same.

The YaR National Forum had organised a two-day seminar- 'Family is Where I Belong', in Kochi, Kerala, which was attended by BREADS partners from both states. Fr. George PS, Executive Director of BREADS presented a paper on 'Alternative forms of care' that BREADS is implementing through its partners. It was also an occasion to share the innovative strategies that BREADS has developed over the years in foster care placements, a rehabilitative option that our country needs to strengthen and make known to the people.

## Santa Eve 2k24

#### - Celebrations with Landslide Survivors

Santa Eve 2k24 on 20 December 2024 was an occasion to remember, for the people of Chooralmala and Mundakkai, who survived the landslides that took place in July 2024. It seemed like a team of Santas had descended on the premises of Don Bosco College in Sulthan Bathery, Wayanad, to bring festive cheer to all of them, reminding them that many people cared about them and their welfare, and that there was a reason to live.



Supported by BREADS and organised by Don Bosco College, the evening for the attendees was filled with fun and frolic, joy and laughter, music, games, activities, and prizes. A traditional Margam Kali (Christian dance in Kerala) performance and vibrant Santa dances by the social work students of the college, entertained the 450+ guests, who also participated enthusiastically in singing carols, dancing with Santa, and playing party games with the volunteers. The children were delighted to receive gifts from Santa Claus. Rations and toiletry kits (essential for their daily life while they wait for the promised government aid) were distributed to 150 families on the occasion. Santa Eve concluded with dinner and



plenty of cakes to carry the sweetness into the coming year.

Fr Dr Antony Thekkedath, Rector & Manager, Don Bosco College, welcomed all the guests and emphasised the importance of community support during times of crisis. Fr Dr Jose Koyickal, Provincial-Salesian Province of Bangalore, in his presidential address, assured the gathering that the Don Bosco support for their rehabilitation would continue through BREADS and Don Bosco College. His Christmas message emphasised the resilience of the human spirit and the need for unity as the community rebuilds itself from the tragedy. Fr Dr Shajan Noronha, Principal of the college, offered the vote of thanks.

BREADS and Don Bosco College have been working with these survivors since the tragedy occurred, offering psychological and other kinds of material support. In a scenario where the initial support from other agencies has quickly ceased, this assurance and continued support from BREADS on behalf of the Don Bosco network, was much appreciated by the people. Most of the guests shared that they were struggling financially







and in no position to celebrate Christmas. Gabriel, a landslide survivor, was expressed gratitude at being invited to the event, their second one here. He said, "Such initiatives help us heal, reflect, and gradually let go of our painful memories. Thank you for creating a safe space for us to reconnect with friends and neighbours; rebuild and rediscover happiness together."

Suresh, another survivor, stated, "We're still recovering from the devastating landslide that occurred a few months back. The emotional toll was immense, and it's taken time to come to terms with our new reality. However, we're now focusing on healing and moving forward. This Christmas programme is a beacon of hope for us, providing a platform to share our experiences, joys, and sorrows. It's a wonderful opportunity to bond and find collective strength."

An apt expression of the true meaning of Christmas!





# First Christmas at Centre for Social Action, Bangalore

BREADS inaugurated the Centre for Social Action this year to reach out to the toddlers and the school-going children in Lingarajapuram (a low-income area), offering creche, evening supplementary education and nutrition services for them. Similarly, on 23 December, around fifty regulars of the evening supplementary centre celebrated Christmas with drama, singing, dances, games and activities. The children enjoyed snacks and their new T-shirts.

The staff thoughtfully coordinated everything to ensure that the children had a blast, and Fr George PS, BREADS' Executive Director engaged both the children and parents with ease. Cakes were cut and Santa did the rounds as well, adding to the festivity and fun!










#### Christmas Celebrations with the SSG Children
